

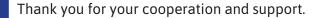

# **Face Coverings**

All our staff, including our administrative staff are wearing face masks in public areas in the surgery now. We are also asking that all patients wear a face covering when they attend the surgery. This may be a scarf or handkerchief. This is another measure to help reduce the risk of spreading the virus and the surgery feel it is appropriate to request this following the new rule that face coverings must be used on public transport from June 15th 2020.





#### **Shielding Update**

Based on need we have adjusted our appointment availability for those patients who are shielding or from shielding households.

We have a GP available each day, all day, for acute clinical issues. We also now have a Nurse and HCA available on Tuesdays and Thursdays all day for routine medical care.

These staff members only see patients from shielding households on those days, they wear protective clothing and clean their rooms between each patient.

Patients are screened for coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms prior to being allowed in the building and any symptomatic patients or patients from symptomatic households are seen away from the premises.

We also maintain regular cleaning of public spaces in our building t hroughout the day to help reduce the risk of infection. We are doing everything we can to make it as safe as possible for all patients, including those who are extremely vulnerable and shielding, to attend for appointments.

We do also only call in those from shielding households when the clinician is ready to see them, so they do not have to wait with other patients.

The latest government advice for those shielding may be updated this week, we will provide a link to the update on our website soon after it is released. If it impacts how we are working with these patients and their households we will send out a further patient update detailing this.

## **NHS App**

To get set up with the NHS App you just need a mobile phone, an email address and some photo ID. Knowing your NHS number is useful but not essential. The set up is relatively quick to do on your mobile phone but it can take up to 4 days to process your ID check and set up your account, but they are trying to do this as quickly as possible. Those we know who have been setting themselves up recently have had their NHS Login confirmed within the same day.

You can still use the app straight away to check symptoms or link to the latest coronavirus information.

Once you have full access you will be asked to link to your GP Surgery. That is a quick link then you can:

- Check your symptoms and get self-care advice
- Book and manage appointments this is currently not available
- Order a repeat prescription
- View your medical record
- Manage your organ donation decision
